



#### Legal regulations

- German Law (in Bavaria: BayHIG Art.2 paragraph 4 und Art.6),
- regulations on accreditation (MRVO) (§§ 10,12,16,33)
- Study and examination regulations of the Higher Education Institutes (HEI)

# Elements in detail (according to ESG)



Standards for Quality Assurance of Joint Programs in the EHEA (European higher Education Area) according to ESG (European Standards and Guidelines)

1. Eligibility	
1.1 Status	<ul> <li>Only elegible for Higher Education Institutions</li> <li>National legal framework must allow participation in joint programs/ joint degrees</li> <li>Double degrees must fit to both (!) degree systems</li> </ul>
1.2 Joint design and delivery	All cooperation insitutions should be envolved
1.3 Cooperation Agreement	<ul> <li>Proposed content:</li> <li>Denomination of degrees</li> <li>Coordination and responsibilities regarding management and financing (including funding, sharing of costs and income etc.)</li> <li>Admission and selection procedures for students</li> <li>Mobility of students and teachers</li> <li>Examination regulations, student assessment methods, recognition of credits and degree awarding procedures</li> </ul>

2. Learning Outcomes	
2.1 Level [ESG 1.2]	<ul> <li>Learning outcomes must fit to</li> <li>corresponding level in the Framework for Qualifications in the European Higher Education Area (FQ-EHEA)</li> <li>applicable national qualifications framework(s)</li> </ul>
2.2 Disciplinary field	<ul> <li>learning outcomes should comprise knowledge, skills, and competencies in the respective disciplinary field(s)</li> </ul>
2.3 Achievement [ESG 1.2]	Demonstration of achieved learning outcomes must be possible
2.4 Regulated Professions (if releveant)	<ul> <li>Take into account minimum training conditions</li> <li>under EU Directive 2005/36/EC</li> <li>under common trainings frameworks established under the Directive</li> </ul>

3. Study Program		
3.1 Curriculum	Structure and content must fit to intended learning outcomes	
3.2 Credits	<ul> <li>European Credit Transfer Systems (ECTS) must be applied</li> <li>Distribution of credits should be clear</li> </ul>	
1.3 Workload	<ul> <li>Joint <u>Bachelor Program</u>:</li> <li>total student workload of 180-240 ECTS-credits</li> <li>Joint <u>Master Program</u>:</li> <li>typically 90-120 ECTS-credits</li> <li>not less than 60 ECTS-credits at second cycle level (credit ranges according to the FQ-EHEA)</li> <li>Joint <u>Doctorates</u>:</li> <li>no credit range specified</li> <li>Workload and the average time to complete the program should be monitored</li> </ul>	



4. Admission and Recognition	
4.1 Admission	admission requirements selection procedures discipline
4.2 Recognition	Recognition of qualifications and of periods of studies (including recognition of prior learning)



5. Learning, Teaching and Assessment		
5.1 Learning and teaching	<ul> <li>program should be designed to correspond with the intended learning outcomes,</li> <li>learning and teaching approaches applied should be adequate to achieve learning outcomes</li> <li>diversity of students/their needs to be respected</li> <li>especially in view of potential different cultural backgrounds</li> </ul>	
5.2 Assessment of students	<ul> <li>examination regulations and the assessment should correspond with intended learning outcomes.</li> <li>should be applied consistently among partner institutions.</li> </ul>	



6. Student Support [ESG 1.6]	<ul> <li>student support services should contribute to the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.</li> <li>They should take into account specific challenges of mobile students.</li> </ul>	
7. Resources [ESG 1.5 & 1.6]		
7.1 Staff	<ul> <li>sufficient and adequate (qualifications, professional and international experience) to implement the study program</li> </ul>	
7.2 Facilities	<ul> <li>sufficient and adequate in view of the intended learning outcomes</li> <li>relevant information about the program (e.g. admission requirement and procedures, course catalogue, examination and assessment procedures) should be well documented and published</li> <li>Take into account specific needs of mobile students</li> </ul>	
8. Transparency and Documentation [ESG 1.8]		
9. Quality Assurance [ESG 1.1 & part 1]	<ul> <li>cooperating institutions should apply joint internal quality assurance processes in accordance with part one of the ESG</li> </ul>	



### Best practice recommendations by HRK

FAU

10 golden rules by HRK (German university rectors' conference)

- 1. Know your **motivation and aims** for establishing the double degree programm
- 2. Choose your partner carefully (good communication and mutual trust are basic for developing learning outcomes and standards and for recognition of academic archievements)
- 3. Develop learning outcomes and aims together
- 4. Assure institutional support of your own HEI
- 5. Assure sufficient academic and administrative ressources
- 6. Enhance Sustainable financial planning
- 7. Make information about the study program easily accessible
- 8. Plan sufficient meetings with the partner HEIs
- 9. Develop a **comon strategy** with regard to **language** (courses): In which language is the study program and what are the possibilities to learn the language of the country?
- 10. Define responsibilities between the partner HEIs clearly

# Establishment of double-degree programs at Friedrich-Alexander-Universität Erlangen-Nürnberg (FAU)



First step: agree with your partner(s) on

detailed **study** plan

Recognition of qualifications and of periods of studies at the partner HEI detailed process for application and admission to the study program

Further documents/details of the contract: time, language, financing, ECTS credits, certifcate, Diploma Supplement... Equivalence table/ Grade conversion table

Implementation of the study program in the processes of quality management (incl. evaluation regulations) at your own and at your partner HEI

#### Paragraph on quality management in the agreement:

"The Coordination Committee (mentioned in § 8) is responsible for quality assurance of the double degree program. At least every other year the committee discusses the results of evaluations at each partner institution in written or oral form. For reasons of documentation the discussions should be followed by a results protocol containing concrete measures developed from the discussion results. There are regular evaluations of the double degree program. In case of a continued negative evaluation, such as non-fulfillment of the mobility objectives, the cooperation can be terminated.

The partner universities confirm that their study programs involved in this co-operation agreement are accredited. If for any reason, one of the partner universities is no longer authorized to award its degree, this institution shall immediately notify the partners, and will be excluded from the program up to a new accreditation, without that it affects the students in the course of the year"

## Special conditions for double degree programs

- One person from each partner university is part of the commission board
- Evaluation results of every partner have to be shared and discussed in the comission board
